News from Skeet and Trap

Tuesday and Thursday night <u>skeet leagues</u> are continuing and Tuesday registered trap shoots are scheduled through December.

The Homecoming Skeet Tournament was a success with 18 shooters.

On October 31, the Skeet & Trap Club hosted an event which started some East Tennessee Youth on an Olympic Journey. 36 Athletes from 7 different East Tennessee teams, ages 10 through 20 participated in the 2nd



Wobble Trap Shoot to Simulate International Bunker, which the athletes will shoot at the Tennessee Junior Olympics in Paris, Tennessee next April.



With very limited access to International Trap (Bunker) fields, Wobble trap is used to simulate the much tougher Olympic discipline. Targets are much faster, with a much wider spread than traditional (American) trap. Athletes' skills are challenged as they change positions between each target. Finally, unlike American trap, 2 shots are allowed at each target. The Skeet and Trap Club provided referees, scorers and officials. The winners were awarded bags from Boyt Harness and Bob Allen Tactical. The ORSA Board of Directors funded the prizes with a \$500 donation. In addition, TNYESS (Tennessee Youth Education for Shooting Sports) provided \$15,000 in scholarship monies. This funding

was awarded into the winning teams Midway USA Foundation Endowment Account.

The day began with a presentation of colors by West High ROTC in an opening ceremony with invocation and our

National Anthem. Competitors fired 4 rounds of 25 targets on alternating fields, plus finals for the top 6 in men's and women's divisions.

After two rounds the competitors stopped for lunch, and then it was back to the competition. When the scorecards were tallied, shoot-offs were conducted to get into the finals. Finals consist of 15 targets and that score was added to preliminary for HOA. Medals were awarded for placement in the finals. Shooting bags and scholarships were awarded on results of total scores. HOA male was 98 (out of 115) and HOA female was 89 (out of 115).



The event was a success, evidenced by great turnout, high scores and the number of athletes who were exposed to the International style game. Several indicated they would like to pursue this challenging discipline, and intend on heading to Paris to represent East Tennessee. Parents, coaches and athletes all had high praise for the grounds,



members, hospitality and the facility we enjoy at ORSA. A number of athletes (about 12) who are part of the ORSA family participated and some came away with awards.

Thanks to ORSA and the member volunteers who donated their time and effort in scoring, cooking, loading machines, officiating and in general the support of our young athletes and future sportsmen (Olympians?).

The stages are always creative and varied, and this year included Hordes of Steel, a Host of Ghosts, and a swarm of Zombies. Among our great sponsors, Craig's Firearms, and WaltherArms USA donated firearms; Hogue Grips and Springfield Armory donated gifts for each competitor's

goody bag. Civilian Marksmanship Program and NRA Highpower Rifle News

The ORSA Highpower Rifle shooters have had a jam-packed schedule since returning from Camp Perry. The long rest was appreciated, but we were ready to get back on the range again. Here are some highlights.

NRA Across the Course & Civilian Marksmanship Program Excellence in Competition Matches

We started with an 80 – Shot NRA match on September 5th, won by Neil Frenzl, High Master, with a 786-28X shooting a match rifle, and Mark Prince was first Master with a 774-21, shot with a service rifle. Then on September 20th we held a Civilian Marksmanship Program Excellence in Competition match. Michael Glasman shot a 470-6X which placed him in position to win his final six-point leg to earn the coveted Distinguished Rifleman Badge, the highest marksmanship award authorized by the US Government for military and civilian competitors. Competition is stiff in these matches as competitors are limited by the number of matches they may shoot in a calendar year to earn points, and shooters are not allowed sighting shots as permitted in NRA matches. Mike will be awarded badge number 2262; badge numbering started 112 years ago.

New Shooter Clinic 17 October

Twenty-Six new shooters took part in the October Clinic. These were the first shooters to take advantage of the new AR-15 rifles (as well as the clubs M1 Garands), shooting coats, spotting scopes, ammunition, and other equipment provided by ORSA Rifle and Pistol. Shooters were provided a safety and operational briefing before being paired up with experienced high power shooters for on-the-range coaching. The clinic was a great success, with some shooters returning the next week to shoot CMP Games events on 24 October.

CMP Games 24-25 October

On 24 October, 12 shooters completed 33 CMP matches. The 30 round course of fire was shot up to three times; with shooters using up to three different rifles. The M1 Garand match was won by Kyle Kirschenmann, shooting a CMP Gold Award 280-1X. John Chubb also earned a Silver Award with a 275-1X. The Vintage Military Rifle match is shot with foreign bolt-action rifles, including Swiss K-31, Mosin-Nagant M-39, Swedish Mausers, and US M1917. John Chubb took the win in VMR with a Gold Award score of 286-8X. Kyle Kirschenmann also won a Gold Award with 282-2X. Both shooters were using the Swiss K-31 and issue GP-11 ammo (you need one too!). The Springfield match is shot using either the US M1903, M1903 Mark I, or M1903A3. Robert Taylor took the win in the Springfield match with a CMP Bronze Award score of 273-3X. The Three-gun aggregate was won by John Chubb with a score of 829-12X. Special shout-out to Jaymore Emmanuel who shot his very first CMP match using all borrowed equipment (and M1 rifle) and fired a very respectable 242!

On 25 October, 10 shooters comprising 5 teams braved the weather forecast (just like for the first Sniper Match) and competed in just the second Vintage Sniper Team Match at ORSA. The VST match is shot with 1953 and earlier original or replica scoped military sniper rifles (the CMP has a very specific list). The replica Remington M1903A4 was very popular, but a Swedish M41 and a Russian M1891/30 Mosin-Nagant (all original!) also competed. The match was close, with the top four teams separated by 10 points. The win went to Robert Taylor

and John Lewis with a Bronze Award score of 369-5X. The other teams were: John Chubb and Chad Cleland; Kyle Kirschenmann and Jerry Zorsch; Gary Miller and David Prince; and David Keiffer and Bill Arnett.

Ed Johnson and Duke Fleming continue to teach our youth and adults the best foundations of marksmanship and safety. Grant Hansen keeps our financials in a state of readiness and organization so we know where we are and what's coming next. Len Bailey has strengthened our administrative processes and been invaluable to me on numerous procedural items. Ken Palmer continues to process your membership applications and maintain our data base. Keith Jimmerson has responded to our growing needs by clearing fallen trees and upgrading the dumpster and Portalets. Don't think that's important? You should have been here some years ago.

I guess where I am going with all this is that we have become a very complex and formidable organization. I am utterly convinced from the shooting sports seminars I have attended and the venues I have visited as a competitor or referee, that facilities that are squared away, professional and neat in appearance have a far better chance of avoiding trouble

from less than friendly folks who upon seeing a rag tag operation may get the impression the group is disorganized and weak.

As to new and exciting venues, by the time this article is published we will have been shooting at your new Rifle Practice Range version .01 for AR and SKS type rifles. This will be an evolving facility. Another example of venue growth is we have hired a professional sporting clays course designer to help us properly install and begin to run a sporting clays facility. Many of you know that Sporting Clays has experienced incredible growth not only for us adults but in youth circles as well. The Oak Ridge Chamber of Commerce, which we have recently rejoined, noted that more and more charities are turning to Sporting Clays to raise money because it is faster and maybe more exciting than golf. This venue with its target sales and ammo sales will also result in taxable revenue that will make ORSA a more significant local and municipal economic contributor, or partner if you will.

Revisiting appearances, a facility such as ours, that currently and by all indicators will continue to host many local, state and nationally sanctioned matches, must be attractive and professional. That alone goes a long way to making participants and their families comfortable and willing to revisit our facility even more in the future. So join us in celebrating and supporting ORSA by doing your part and maybe just ask of yourself "is that all there is?"
