SMALLBORE RIFLE CLASS

The next smallbore rifle class for new shooters will start Monday, October 8, 2012 at 7:00 pm. We will meet at the indoor range. The class is for ages 11 through adult. The class will meet for seven weeks and covers firearm safety, shooting positions, shooting fundamentals, and an introduction to formal range procedures. ORSA will furnish the necessary equipment including rifle, shooting pad, coat, and ammunition. Each student must furnish his or her own eye and ear protection. Bullseye Pistol Class

ORSA 3-gun

The AR15.com/Rockcastle Pro-Am 3-gun Championship was held August 23-26 at the Rockcastle Shooting Center, located north of Bowling Green, KY. The match was the single largest gathering of competitors and sponsors for the fast growing sport of 3-Gun. Over 500 competitors, including the biggest names in the sport, from 43 states and three foreign countries participated in the event, and ORSA was well represented in this match. Congratulations to ORSA member Kevin Suffridge who won the Amateur Tactical Division. Jason Edwards, a regular competitor at our 3-Gun, USPSA, and IDPA matches finished 12th place against the best competition in the country, in the Pro Tactical Division. 3-Gun competition involves using a pistol, shotgun, and rifle on a variety of targets, including flying clays, paper, steel plates, poppers, and metal flash targets. For the Pro Division, rifle shots over 300 yards were required. The competition was divided into two groups, Pro and Amateur; the participants in the two groups competed in either Tactical or Open Divisions, based on the configuration of their firearms. In the Tactical division your rifle is allowed to have one optic (scope or red dot/holographic sight), the pistol and shotgun required to have only iron sights, and the shotgun was limited to 9 rounds at the start.

In the Open division, rifles could have more than one optic, pistol and shotgun could also be equipped with optics, and the shotgun capacity was not limited. In this division, some competitors were using an X-Rail system which allows the competitor to have up to 25 rounds loaded in the shotgun.

In addition to the main competition, there were numerous raffles and Pro Clinics were available from some of the top shooters in the 3-Gun world both Friday and Saturday night. There was also unique side matches; one notable such match entailed going into a cave to shoot USPSA targets using a suppressed .45 pistol equipped with IR lasers while wearing night vision goggles.

After each day of competition, everyone gathered back at the lodge for some delicious food, cold beverages, telling tales and socializing until well into the night. The accommodations available at the Rockcastle Shooting center were first rate and the vendors that were present covered all aspects of the 3 Gun shooting family. The NRA and a host of their board members were also present.

If your interest in this type of shooting is piqued, please come out to one of our monthly 3-Gun matches – time and date are shown on the ORSA calendar. Richard Stouder ◆ There has been a recent stir in internet traffic and some articles in Fox News on the web where over a billion rounds of ammunition have been bought by the Department of Homeland Security, the Social Security Administration, NOAA, and other government agencies. You just have to take that in for a minute - over a billion rounds and a majority if it hollow point bullets. Why would the Social Security Administration need millions of rounds of hollow point bullets? NOAA??

The Department of Homeland Security is not forthcoming with their purchases. Agencies make purchases like this via a web site named FedBizOpps. A solicitation in mid August for DHS to purchase ammunition on behalf of Immigration& Customs Enforcement contained numerous blocked out sections. Redaction of this nature must only be for national security reasons and must be approved by Congress. Nonetheless, the redacted portions included references to the amount of .223 62 grain and .223 64 grain ammunition being purchased. The ammo purchase solicitation further stated that this was not subject to "full and open competition" and their justification for this was an "unusual and compelling urgency." Further DHS stated

that there is a shortage of bullets which is threatening a situation which could cause "substantial safety issues for the government" threat should law enforcement not be adequately armed. In March DHS purchased 450 million rounds of .40 caliber hollow point bullets. This was followed up this summer where DFS ordered an additional 750 million rounds of assorted ammunition. The only response DHS has provided is that these purchased are for training purposes. You draw your own conclusions for all this. I'm not a conspiracy theorist but it is inane to believe this is the purchase of training ammunition.

In these columns I have often warned that the gun control crowd will never rest. Several items follow that merit attention.

The New York and Connecticut legislatures are looking to implement microstamping technology requirements. This could result in Remington and Colt being forced out of those states.

Microstamping, or ballistic imprinting, is a patented process that uses laser technology to engrave a tiny marking of the make, model and serial number on the tip of a gun's firing pin to allow an imprint of that information on spent cartridge cases. Supporters of the technology say it will be a "game changer," allowing authorities to quickly identify the registered guns used in crimes. Opponents claim the process is costly, unreliable and may ultimately impact the local economies that heavily depend on the gun industry, including Ilion, N.Y., where Remington Arms maintains a factory, and Hartford, Conn., where Colt's manufacturing is headquartered.

The closure of Remington's plant in the 8,000-resident village would be a "huge hit" to the local economy, Meanwhile, in Connecticut, similar microstamping legislation has long been opposed by Colt, whose executives have claimed the "feel-good legislation" would drive gun manufacturers out of the state.

Since the tragedy in Aurora, CO gun control activists have been demanding change to our gun control laws. We have had two separate acts trying to hurt ammo regulations submitted since the shooting. One that would limit your clips and magazines to only ten rounds, another that will prevent you from buying ammo online or by mail. They are taking advantage of a terrible situation to demand gun control rather than try to prevent another tragedy from occurring. If they were serious about stopping mass shootings, they would introduce a bill to repeal the so-called Gun-Free School Zones Act. One thing that is shown to stop mass shootings is the presence of an armed potential victim. If they want to get serious about saving lives, they should stop trying to pass laws that will only affect law-abiding citizens.

Shortly after attaching the Large Capacity Magazine Ban to the Cyber Security Act the Democrats have submitted another piece of gun control literature. On July 30 Senator Frank Lautenberg, who was also a sponsor of the Large Capacity Magazine Ban, and Representative Carolyn McCarthy announced the plans for the 'Stop Online Ammunition Sales Act' at a New York City news conference.

The outline of this new act consists of:

- It requires anyone selling ammunition to be a licensed dealer.
- It requires ammunition buyers who are not licensed dealers to present photo ID at the time of purchase, effectively banning the online or mail order purchase of ammo by regular civilians.
- It requires licensed ammunition dealers to maintain records of the sale of ammunition.
- It requires licensed ammunition dealers to report the sale of more than 1,000 rounds of ammunition to an unlicensed person within any five consecutive business days.

There is some good news out of Colorado this week. The residents of Colorado have reflected on the situation in Aurora and took it upon themselves to stay safe. Gun sales are up 40% in Colorado since the horrific shooting. More and more people are starting to realize that gun control laws will not protect them or keep weapons out of the hands of criminals. Someone will be carrying a gun next time a lunatic goes off the deep end and he will not be sitting in court house like a zombie awaiting charges he will be six feet under thanks to our Second Amendment.

These gun grabbers are taking advantage of a horrible situation to try to get gun control passed. Twelve people are dead and over fifty are injured not because it is legal to buy a gun but because someone went crazy and no one had a gun to take him down. If you were a criminal, would you rather try to take out a classroom where it is known no weapons are allowed? Or would you rather go into a classroom where every student has a .44 mag on their hip? These gun control laws are preventing everyday citizens from protecting themselves. Criminals do not obey laws. Why would they follow gun control laws?

And a last thought. How about Associate Justice of the Supreme Court Eric Holder? Remember – elections have consequences. The next President of the Unite States will appoint a minimum of two and maybe three justices. In the two most recent Second Amendment rulings by the Supreme Court the votes were 5-4. We were one vote away from the elimination of an individual's right to keep and bear arms. Make your voice heard – VOTE.
